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SAN DIEGO COMIC FEST'S 10TH ANNIVERSARY



The origins of San Diego Comic Fest are intertwined with those of San Diego Comic-Con. In 1969, a teenage boy named Mike Towry and a group of friends created the idea of a gathering of fans who shared a love of comics and science fiction. Only a few people showed up to that first event held in the basement of the US Grant Hotel. However, as the years went by, more and more people attended this event, known as San Diego Comic-Con.

In 2009, the San Diego Comic-Con celebrated its 40th anniversary and they brought back the show's founders to celebrate this milestone. The convention had grown in size and created more offerings, but it tended to lose the intimacy as the event grew. Comic-Cons of the 1970s created a unique setting where you could enjoy time and become friends with comics giants like Jack Kirby, Neal Adams, Bob Clampett, and Sergio Aragones. At the 40th Comic-Con, they created the idea of bringing about an event that felt like the original days of the show, where fans could have a more intimate experience with legendary creators. So, Mike Towry, Richard Alf and a group of dedicated volunteers put their heads together and created San Diego Comic Fest.

San Diego Comic Fest debuted in 2012 with a return to the origins of Comic-Con. That year, Murphy Anderson held the title of Guest of Honor. Like Comic-Con, San Diego Comic Fest grew but at a rate that retained the intimacy. Fans loved the relaxed atmosphere where they would spend the weekend hanging out with their favorite writers and artists. The San Diego Comic Fest volunteers committees selected new themes each year to shake up the atmosphere and programming, including 100 Years of Jack Kirby, 200 Years of Mary Shelley's Frankenstein, 50 Years of the Apollo 11 Moon Landing, 100 Years of Ray Bradbury and Ray Harryhausen.

The good word about San Diego Comic Fest spread among fans and professionals. The event grew to incorporate more films, gaming and community involvement. The Guest of Honor title has been held by comic industry giants, including Murphy Anderson, Larry Niven, Neal Adams, Bryan & Mary Talbot, Jim Valentino, Karen Berger, Sergio Aragones, Bill Sienkiewicz and Peter David. Each year, attendees continue to talk about their wonderful experiences at San Diego Comic Fest and look forward to the next one.

As we approach our tenth event, we want to express our deepest gratitude to our founder, Mike Towry. His vision and dedication have been instrumental in making San Diego Comic Fest a reality. We also want to thank the attendees, special guests, artists, gamers, event staff, and volunteers who have contributed to the success of this event. San Diego Comic Fest is more than just a weekend gathering; it is a vibrant community united by a shared love of comics.

CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

At every San Diego Comic Fest, we always want to stand on the shoulders of giants. We want to celebrate the people and events that shaped the world of comics. After much back-and-forth discussion, we asked, "Why not both?" In 2024, we celebrate 100 years of Rod Serling and 100 years of Harvey Kurtzman.

Rod Serling gave the world the gift of *The Twilight Zone*. These twisted stories made the world question its existence, shocked us, and set a new standard for science fiction stories. *The Twilight Zone* still stands the test of time as one of the best shows ever made and continues to inspire fans and creators. Rod Serling perfected the art of the twist ending, turning a world on its head. The screenplay he wrote for *Planet of the Apes* would prove that.

Harvey Kurtzman gave us the gift of laughter. He was a creative genius of cartoons and visual storytelling. He found new ways to make gag humor work and introduced us to the Usual Gang of Idiots. The world knows him as one of the founding fathers of *MAD* and the creator of Alfred E. Neuman. *Beyond the Mad Madness*, his work at EC Comics and Playboy inspired countless creators and entertained fans worldwide. It is safe to say that Harvey Kurtzman revolutionized satire with his cartoons.

Serling made people of this world question their mortality, morality, and reality as they descended into madness. Meanwhile, Kurtzman made us laugh at twisted gags on a nonstop ride into the other side of madness. The world owes Rod Serling and Kurtzman a debt for the gift of their stories. We may never be able to repay that debt, but we will start by honoring 100 years of their legacies at San Diego Comic Fest.



Rod Serling redefined science fiction storytelling in *The Twilight Zone*, *Night Gallery* and penned the screenplay for *Planet of the Apes*.

Born in Kansas City, Missouri, in 1946 and grew up in Wichita, Kansas. He graduated from the University of Kansas in Lawrence, where his first cartoons were published in the University Daily Kansan.

He worked as staff artist for two weekly papers in Wichita before moving to San Diego in 1975. For 36 years he illustrated the *Straight from the Hip* column for the *San Diego READER*.

He began work in comics in 1977 and was for thirteen years a contributor to the Funny Pages of *National Lampoon*. His comic stories have also been published in *Heavy Metal*, *Dark Horse Comics and DC Comics/Paradox Press* and *American Bystander*. His early comic work has been collected in *Housebound with Rick Geary* from Fantagraphics Books.

During a four-year stay in New York, his illustrations appeared regularly in *The New York Times Book Review*. His illustration work has also been seen in *MAD*, *Spy*, *Rolling Stone, The Los Angeles Times, The Old Farmer's Almanac*, and *American Libraries*.

He has written and illustrated three children's book based on *The Mask for Dark Horse* and two Spider-Man children's books for Marvel. His children's comic *Society of Horrors* ran in *Disney Adventures* magazine (1996-2006). He was the artist for the 2006-7 series of *GUMBY* comics, written by Bob Burden, for which they received the 2007 Eisner Comic Industry Award for Best Publication for a Younger Audience.

His graphic novels include three adaptations for Classics illustrated, and he has completed nine volumes in the series *A Treasury of Victorian Murder* and four volumes of *A Treasury of 20th Century Murder*, the most recent of which is *Black Dahlia*. His other historically-based graphic novels include *J. Edgar Hoover: A Graphic Biography* and *Trotsky: A Graphic Biography*, both for Hill & Wang. A fictional murder mystery, *Louise Brooks: Detective*, was released in 2015.

Under his imprint Home Town Press, he has written and illustrated eight graphic novels: the Elwell Enigma, A is for Antichrist: Obama's Conspiracy Alphabet, The True Death of Billy the Kid and Murder at the Hollywood Hotel, The Story of the Lincoln County War, Chester and Grace: The Adirondack Murder, The Wallace Mystery and Carrizozo: An Illustrated History.

Rick has received the Inkpot Award from the San Diego Comic Convention (1980) and, from the National Cartoonists Society, the award for Best Book and Magazine Illustration (1994) and for Best Graphic Novel (2017). His work has been translated into French, German, Spanish, Italian, Swedish, Japanese and Croatian.

In 2007, Rick and his wife, Deborah, moved to the town of Carrizozo, New Mexico.



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
